10 Tips to Refine Your Course Assessments

- 1. Make sure you measure each of your learning outcomes with at least one assignment, activity, quiz or exam.
- 2. Check student progress throughout the semester with low-stakes formative assessments. Regular, low-stakes assessments let you and the student know how they are doing during your course, not just after it's too late to make a change.
- 3. The best <u>summative assessments</u> are cumulative and require students to recall and retrieve important information, at different times, in multiple ways.
- 4. Be transparent. Let students know how, when and why they are being assessed.
- 5. Provide clear instructions for every assignment, activity and exam question, along with the resources needed for students to be successful.
- 6. Use a combination of <u>assessment types</u> to meet the needs of diverse learners. Provide multiple ways for students to show their learning.
- 7. Complete the assessment yourself. If you can't do it, they won't be able to either.
- 8. For assignments and essay-type questions, <u>rubrics</u> are an essential tool to ensure fairness, objectivity and consistency in your grading.
- Using multiple choice questions doesn't mean you can't test higher order thinking.

- 10. Keep in mind when you design your assessments that you are measuring a student's knowledge, not their test-taking skills.
